To be an Apprentice - Answers

Answer 1: The minimum age you have to be is 16 years.

Answer 2: Yes and with a contract of employment.

Answer 3: Most apprenticeships require a grade C, this may vary depending the apprenticeship.

Answer 4: There is NO maximum age.

What is an Apprenticeship

An apprenticeship is a genuine job and under all circumstances an apprentice will be employed from day one. Apprenticeships combine practical training in a job with study. An apprentice will:

- work alongside experienced staff
- gain job-specific skills
- earn a wage and get holiday pay
- be given time for study related to their role (the equivalent of one day a week)
- earn a real wage;
- be trained in the skills employers want;
- set yourself up for the future – apprentices enjoy salary increases when they complete their training, and those completing a higher apprenticeship could see increased earnings over their lifetime

Apprenticeship Levels

All apprenticeships include elements of on the job and off the job training, leading to industry recognised standards or qualifications. Some apprenticeships also require an assessment at the end of the programme to assess the apprentice's ability and competence in their job role.

Apprenticeship	Level	Equivalent Educational Level
Intermediate	2	2 5 GCSE passes at grade A*– C or 9 – 4
Advance	3	2 A level passes/Level 3 Diploma
Higher	4, 5, 6	Foundation degree and above
Degree	6 and 7	Bachelor's or master's degree



Entry Requirements

Entry requirements Apprenticeships are available to anyone over the age of 16, living in England and have no upper age limit. The National Apprenticeship Service is committed to ensuring that high quality apprenticeships are a prestigious option, accessible to all people from all backgrounds. All vacancies on Find an apprenticeship will clearly state what the entry requirements are for the job role being advertised.

There will be different entry requirements depending on the industry or job role.

Where to look for an Apprenticeship

With so many opportunities on offer, there are several ways you can find an apprenticeship.
